

H.R.H. Crown Prince Haakon's Visit Commemorates 200 Years of Norwegian Emigration

From October 6-9, H.R.H. Crown Prince Haakon toured the United States to commemorate 200 years of organized Norwegian emigration to the United States

The tour kicked off in Decorah, Iowa, at the Vesterheim Museum, where H.R.H. Crown Prince Haakon met with descendants of the "Sloopers"—the Norwegian immigrants who arrived in America on the ship "Restauration". He also visited Luther College, where he was conferred with an honorary doctorate, a testament to the academic and cultural partnership between Norway and the college.

The Minnesota visit began at Norway House, where H.R.H. opened the new Saga Center and attended the USA-Norway Business Summit. At the State Capitol, he reaffirmed ties with Governor Tim Walz and honored the 50-year partnership with the Minnesota National Guard. He also celebrated cultural heritage at Mindekirken and St. Olaf. At Augsburg University, he joined NHL's Mats Zuccarello to support youth sports inclusion with the DinoMights.

In New York, the Crown Prince welcomed the ship Restauration, a replica of the vessel that carried that first group of Norwegian emigrants across the Atlantic in 1825.



Norway has always been a country of immigration and emigration, but the large number of overseas emigrants during a relatively limited period in nineteenth and twentieth centuries is significant in Norwegian history. About 900 000 Norwegian women and men have emigrated to North America from 1825 until present.

Those who emigrated during the period 1865-1930 make up 87 per cent of the total number of emigrants.

An important goal of the Bicentennial commemoration of Norwegian emigration in 2025 is to bring the topic of emigration to the public sphere and to shed more light on forgotten and neglected topics relating to Norwegian migration.

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Some Cultural Items for the Month

Cultural Corner: Emigration to New York

There was a Norwegian presence in New Amsterdam (New York after 1664) in the early part of 17th century. Hans Hansen Bergen, a native of Bergen, Norway, was one of the earliest settlers of the Dutch colony of New Amsterdam having immigrated in 1633.





Approximately 60 persons had settled in the Manhattan area before the British take-over in 1664.

The arrival of the slooper ship "Restauration" in 1825 is considered the beginning of Norwegian group migration original city map of New

to America. Of the 52 persons aboard, only the skipper is reported to have remained in New York City as most continued on via the Erie Canal through the Great Lakes to the Midwestern states of the United States. It was not until 1836 when Norwegians came here in substantial numbers. The fjord-to-prairie migration continued, as the farmland was rich and reminded them of home. Generally, the Norwegians who remained in New York City did not as a rule stay of their own volition, and the metropolis soon earned the reputation of being "a genuine home for all beggars, arch pickpockets, and swindlers."

At the tip of Battery Park is Castle Garden, the most historic site in



New York City. It had many functions and names in its long history and was converted into the first Immigration Processing Station in New York on August 1, 1855. It continued in that capacity for thirty-five years and it is estimated 8,500,000 immigrants who passed through its gates, Norwegians among them.

In 1880, a depression ravaged Norway, and the agricultural crisis in the old country resulted in the settlement of the American West, but the importance for the Norwegian settlement in New York and later in Brooklyn was the transition from a sailing ship to steam engine which spiraled Norway into the maritime crisis. Many sailors would desert their ships and stay in the eastern

early settlers were later followed by men in the building trades and ship workers from the coastal towns of Norway. At a young age, these workers had been trained to make a living in a sea locale. It was during the period from about 1850 to 1890 that the first "colony" grew up in Manhattan, in the neighborhoods now bound by the Brooklyn Bridge, the Manhattan Bridge, along the East River. It was in this area that Norwegian immigrants lived, worked, and built their churches.

In the 1870's, the Norwegian population in New York began migrating across the East River and purchased houses in the relatively sparsely settled sections of Old South Brooklyn and Greenpoint, thus forming their second community. The Hamilton ferry docked at the foot of Brooklyn's Hamilton Avenue. During the period between 1870 and 1910, men could either walk to work or commute to Manhattan; since the ferry connected both sections to Manhattan. Norway was in the middle of an economic change while New York offered many jobs with good paying wages to men who were skilled in building, repairing, and the handling of ships. Therefore, the Norwegian-born population more than doubled. At the turn of the century, there were only 11,387 persons classified as Norwegians in New York. But by 1910, this figure had increased to 25,013 born in Norway, and another 12,392 born in America of Norwegian parents and the number was on the rise. The Norwegians were not the only group, which increased in population. After 1865, many south Europeans, particularly Italians from Sicily, were now occupying their area of residence. This increase of another population made it necessary to demolish the one-and two-family houses and soon tenements were built in their places. The green grassy areas had rapidly disappeared. Once again the Norwegians shifted their establishment. Their traditional love of the sea and of nature, coupled with their desire to

have plenty of space around them, compelled them to migrate when conditions they believed were no longer existed in Old South Brooklyn or Greenpoint.

By 1890, the Norwegian population was again on the move. The residents of the Greenpoint section had scattered in all directions. The inhabitants of Old South Brooklyn continued to shift to the southeast, toward the fashionable area, around Prospect Park in the Park Slope sections. This established the third center



of Norwegian settlement in New York. More churches were soon built, plus social, benevolent and charitable institutions were founded. These agencies aided the Norwegian immigrants to adapt themselves to life in America and provided them with necessary benefits. The Norwegians formed a close-knit community within a quickly expanding Brooklyn. But the constant growth of Brooklyn and the construction of the Fourth Avenue subway, completed in 1915, allowed the immigrants to remain within commuting distance of the shipping center in Red Hook. But the city's never ending encroachment upon their residential area took its toll so yet again; their movement was toward the southwest along the sea, into the Sunset Park section of Brooklyn. By 1928 this was no longer accurate. Other nationalities and creeds had moved in while the Norwegian population in Brooklyn centered at the intersection of 7th Ave. and 57th St.

History Article: The Rose Church -- part 4

The Rosemaling Artwork and Palette continued: The rosemaling artists used continuous borders of S strokes, dots, and lines, simplistic, yet complementary, in yellow, and, again, like most elements, they are outlined in black.



The artists used blue to paint the border scrolls on the gallery, which contrasts well with the yellow scrolls and leaves on the central column, the white background on the walls, and the yellow vases, below which Is painted a faux finish • curtain · in grey and white. The ceiling is painted with hundreds of white stars and a yellow moon on a grey background.

The pulpit exhibits again the same blue and yellow, a very Swedish ColorInfluence, and Is adorned with panels of Renaissance-style floral

motifs and naive angels. The palette the artist used was likely to come from pigments available to him in the local area: yellow, red. blue, and tints of these colors. All elements are outlined in black

Biblical Motifs: Tradition held that women and men should sit separately within the church, with women on the left- hand side or northern wall of the building. The women's wall Is decorated with the figure of Christin



the middle surrounded by wise (good) and foolish (bad) virgins. The figures are flat and two-dimensionally painted in a naive fashion. Other biblical characters that adorn the walls Include David and Goliath and Samson and the lion.

Structural remnants salvaged from the original stave church can be been in the slightly mismatched timber celling of the RosekyrkJa's entrance vestibule,

· said to come from the chancel in the old church. The foundation under the pulpit and the baptismal font, both carved, are also from the original church, as are the stave church's four central log pillars.

Another interesting relic from medieval times Is the -poor" pole, which Is a long pole with a red fabric pouch attached to one end. The pouch Is decoratively trimmed with glass beads and was used to collect money from the poor who were often considered unclean. As such, they were required to sit in the outer wings or even outside the church.

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The ship hanging above the pews is a common object in Scandinavian churches. Being symbolic of the rough passage possibly experienced through life, the ship that hangs in Rosekyrkja Is thought to date from the 1700s, or even older.

Each pew ls unique and was built and carved by each owner, or family, whose name Is written on It. The villagers without registered land (tenant farmers) were seated at the rear of the church under the gallery on the narrow benches without backs. The richest families were always closest to the altar. The exterior church walls are plain white; however, every inch of the Interior walls, columns, and ceiling are richly decorated. From biblical figures to scrolls, floral and fruit elements, borders, and faux finishes, there Is no section left unpainted? Given that churches and houses in the area had been, up to this time, largely undecorated. It must have been quite an experience for the farmers to see this much decoration. The people obviously liked what they saw, because church services were very popular. Barbara
