Discover the Hidden Roots of the Runes

A long time ago, runes were used by the Shamans of Scandinavia and the word "rune" at its origin made reference to mystery. Runes were used as protective symbols and were carved in wood, bone, or stone.

The Runes Revealed to Odin

The appearance of the runes goes back to the times of Odin, the god of magic and wisdom. Odin was a man always in search of absolute knowledge, but such knowledge cannot be attained by the simplistic human means provided by the senses. It was because of this fact that Odin had to renounce an eye in order to be able to drink from the spring of wisdom.





He then reversed the human methods of knowledge by mortally hurting himself with a spear and hanging down from a tree in a cold region for two days and two nights. The 18 magical runes were revealed to him when death was drawing near. The images of these runes were spread across the land by the god who had conquered death and their number increased to 24.


The Connection Between Wood and the Runes

The Futhark alphabet was derived from the runes, but the runes themselves kept their magical properties. They were used to contact the dead, for protection, or for flight. Runes were also used for divination and as a means of contacting other plains of existence. Runes can be drawn on wood (especially oak wood, beech wood, or pine wood), bone, shells, paper, or stone (especially quartz). By manually drawing or carving the runes, a stronger connection is created than using runes made by others.

The Runic Alphabet.

Generally, the most common material for making runes is wood. This is due to the importance of this element for Norse mythology. Two examples can be given to explain: First of all, the universe is structured in the form of a tree. This is the sacred tree Yggdrasil, the one that sustains the various worlds that hang from its branches. There are nine worlds in the Norse perspective: Muspellheim (the land of fire), Asgard (the heaven of the gods), Ljosalfheim (the land of the spirits of the light), Vanaheim (the land of the spirits of water), Midgard (the land of the humans), Jotunheim (the land of the giants), Svartalfheim (the land of the spirits of the night and the first underground land), Hellheim (the land of the dead) and Nifelheim (the land of ice, cold and fog, a sort of exterior inferior world).





BOOK CORNER:

The Last Viking: The Life of Roald Amundsen by Stephen R. Bown

The Last Viking unravels the life of the man who stands head and shoulders above all those who raced to map the last corners of the world. In 1900, the four great geographical mysteries—the Northwest Passage, the Northeast Passage, the South Pole, and the North Pole—remained blank spots on the globe. Within twenty years Roald Amundsen would claim all four prizes. Renowned for his determination and technical skills, both feared and beloved by his men, Amundsen is a legend of the heroic age of exploration, which shortly thereafter would be tamed by technology, commerce, and publicity. Féted in his lifetime as an international celebrity, pursued by women and creditors, he died in the Arctic on a rescue mission for an inept rival explorer.

Stephen R. Bown has unearthed archival material to give Amundsen's life the grim immediacy of Apsley Cherry-Garrard's *The Worst Journey in the World*, the exciting detail of *The Endurance*, and the suspense of a Jon Krakauer tale. *The Last Viking* is both a thrilling literary biography and a cracking good story.

VIKINGS (TV SERIES)

Vikings is an Irish-Canadian historical drama television series written and created by Michael Hirst for the television channel History. Filmed in Ireland, it premiered on March 3, 2013 in Canada and the United States.

Vikings is inspired by the sagas of Viking Ragnar Lothbrok, one of the best-known legendary Norse heroes and notorious as the scourge of England and France. The show portrays Ragnar as a farmer who rises to fame by successful raids into England, and



eventually becomes a Scandinavian king, with the support of his family and fellow warriors: his brother Rollo, his son Björn Ironside, and his wives—the shield maiden Lagertha and the princess Aslaug.



Premise

The series is inspired by the tales of the raiding, trading, and exploring Norsemen of early medieval Scandinavia. It follows the exploits of the legendary Viking chieftain Ragnar Lothbrok and his crew and family, as notably laid down in the 13th century sagas *Ragnars saga Loðbrókar* and *Ragnarssona þáttr*, as well as in Saxo Grammaticus's 12th century work *Gesta Danorum*. Norse legendary sagas were partially fictional tales based in Norse oral tradition, written down about 200 to 400 years after the events they describe. Further inspiration is taken from historical sources of the period, such as records

of the Viking raid on Lindisfarne depicted in the second episode, or Ahmad ibn Fadlan's 10th-century account of the Volga Vikings. The series is set at the beginning of the Viking Age, marked by the Lindisfarne raid in 793.

Historical accuracy

Some critics have pointed out historical inaccuracies in the series' depiction of Viking society. Lars Walker, in the magazine *The American Spectator*, criticized its portrayal of Viking Age government (in the person of Earl Haraldson) as autocratic rather than essentially democratic. Joel Robert Thompson criticized the show's depiction of the Norse peoples' supposed ignorance of the existence of Britain and Ireland, and the use of the death penalty instead of outlawry (*skoggangr*) as a punishment for heinous crimes.



Monty Dobson, a historian at Central Michigan University, criticized the show's depictions of Viking Age clothing, but went on to state that fictional shows like *Vikings* could still be a useful teaching tool. The Norwegian newspaper *Aftenposten* reported that the series incorrectly depicted the temple at Uppsala as a stave church in the mountains, whereas the historical temple was situated on flat land and stave churches were a hallmark of later Christian architecture in Scandinavia. On the other hand, the temple as depicted in the show does have similarities with the reconstructions of the Uppåkra hof. The show also portrays a crucifixion of a prominent character instigated by a Christian bishop near Wessex,



apparently as a standard punishment for apostasy, an event that may or may not have a basis in historical fact, as Emperor Constantine officially outlawed crucifixion in the 4th century.

Regarding the historical accuracy of the show, showrunner Michael Hirst comments that "I especially had to take liberties with 'Vikings' because no one knows for sure what happened in the Dark Ages" and that "we want people to watch it. A historical account of the Vikings would reach hundreds, occasionally thousands, of people. Here we've got to reach millions."

NORDIC RECIPES:

Viking Solæg (Eggs in brine)

Ingredients:

1/2 dozen large eggs, preferably pastured eggs from chickens that are allowed to forage

1 red beet, peeled and grated

1/2 cup cane sugar

1/2 cup kosher salt

1/2 cup cider vinegar

1/2 cup red wine vinegar

1 cup water

1 bay leaf

approximately 1/2 tsp. freshly ground caraway seed

freshly ground black pepper

1 lemon

salmon caviar (preserved in a jar, available from many fishmongers and IKEA) 1/2 cup of mayonnaise

about 1 cup finely shredded green cabbage, for serving



For the eggs:

Place the eggs in cold water in a pot over high heat. Bring to a boil and watch carefully. As soon as they begin to boil, pull them off the heat, cover with a lid and set a timer for 7-8 minutes depending on how hard cooked you prefer your eggs. As soon as the timer goes off plunge the eggs into ice water to stop their cooking. Peel and set aside.

In a medium pot combine the grated beet, sugar, salt, vinegars, water, bay leaf, and caraway. Bring to a boil, turn down, and allow to simmer for 15-20 minutes. Pour the brine through a strainer and cool. Pour the cooled brine over the peeled eggs and refrigerate 24 hours before eating. The eggs will keep for a month or more, but the longer they stay in the brine, the darker their color and the stronger the flavor will become.

For the mayonnaise:

Mix together the mayonnaise, about 1 tsp. black pepper depending on preference, and 2 tsps. freshly squeezed lemon juice.

To serve the eggs, cut them in half and place on a bed of shredded green cabbage. Put a teaspoon of the mayonnaise on each half and spoon about 6 or 7 salmon eggs over each.

Cinnamon Coffee Cake from Norway

Ingredients:

- 1/3 cup butter
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1/4 cup cornstarch
- 2 tsp.baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 salt
- 1/2 tsp. ground cardamom
- 1/2 cup milk

Instructions:

- cream butter and sugar
- beat eggs
- mix all ingredients and put in a well-greased baking pan
- sprinkle topping on cake mixture
- bake 375 for 30 min.

Topping:

- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 cup nuts,,,optional

International Vice-President Ron Stubbings used the above quote in his remarks at our 3D Convention and I love them. I will focus on those words for the next two years. Our challenge is that some things in the rear view mirror – memories of our Norwegian heritage – must not be forgotten and must be

preserved but we must move forward and respond to bends and turns in the road ahead. How do we connect more people to that heritage? How do we strengthen the ties that already bind?

We will continue to focus on membership, leadership, community and communication. There are a few committees forming to address specific aspects of each of these very important issues; if you are asked to serve on a committee, I hope you will accept. Diversity of experiences and opinions generally results in a well thought out solution. Some of the committees and their tasks include:

Communication – the first item to be examined is the TDT – an enormous amount of effort goes into producing a monthly newsletter. Is it worth it? We have approximately 5500 members with approximately 3500 email addresses; so at most we can reach 60% of our membership. But the newsletter is opened by on average, 35% of the recipients or 1,220 members which represents 20% of our membership!!! Is a monthly newsletter worth the time & producing it, if at most only 20% of our members open it???? is a quarterly newsletter a better alternative? Join the conversation – Deb McConaghy of Norsk Carolina is heading this committee. There are many other aspects of communication and more committees will be forming.

Membership – our Vice-President Kathy Dollymore is in the process of forming three committees each of which will concentrate on a specific aspect of retaining and attracting new members.

Leadership – I will be working with many members throughout the District to develop leadership tools. I am thinking of videos, train the trainer sessions and more. If you are interested in helping with developing aleadership curriculum let me know!

There are other committees actively at work and you will hear more about them over the next few months.

Your Board can not do it alone!


